IASE 13th Biennial Conference Highlights

The IASE 13th Biennial Conference was intended for all those who believe that children, youth, and young adults with special education needs deserve all the supports to develop their potential and become equal members of society. This conference truly illustrated how bridges have been built towards inclusive education through research, innovation, and best practices in order to make the world a more inclusive place for every child and young adult as well as to contribute to their own experiences.

The conference was an important event for Vancouver as well as for IASE. The first IASE conference was held in Vancouver in 1989. Our founder, Dr. Marg Csapo, claims that we have "come home again" to celebrate 28 years of achievements in the field. The Dean of the Faculty of Education at the University of British Columbia (UBC), Dr. Blye Frank, opened our welcome ceremony at the Museum of Anthropology. Dr. Frank emphasized that we all share a commitment toward the development of special education throughout the world. He further concluded that UBC is a 'place of mind' and that we need to continue to work across diverse cultural divides in order to bridge the distance between segregation and inclusion.

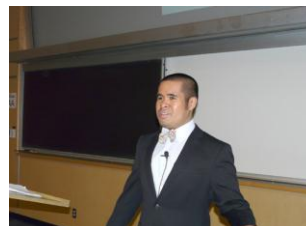
The Coastal Wolf Pack, First Nation Band (photo below), dazzled us with their ceremonial welcome. Conference participants were



welcomed by a diverse roster of distinguished dignitaries and speakers whose inspirational speeches addressed inclusive approaches from different angles and journeys. Some of our featured speakers included Vancouver Assistant Deputy Mayor, Adriane Carr and Assistant Deputy Minister, Ron Allen (photos below).



As emphasized by the Assistant Deputy Minister Ron Allen, "I understand the need for inclusive practices and appreciate the work.... Inclusion reflects fundamental principles in society celebrating diversity while promoting development and learning for everyone, and providing for social participation in learning and caring environments, peer relations, and interactions."



J.A. Tan, a Vancouver-based visual artist (photo on left) described his life as being "A PART OF... NOT APART" as depicted by his artwork featured on IASE conference bags. He expressed his message as follows: "Through my art I had the opportunity to break out of the silence of autism.

I believe I need to continually uninhabited this silence. I slowly unveiled the mystery of this condition for myself and others."

Dr. Liliانا Mayo (photo below), Founder and General Director of the Centro Ann Sullivan del Peru (CASP) discussed the core elements of the CASP model: "Treat me like a person, use a functional curriculum, and know that families are teaching partners." The results of using this model demonstrate that all individuals can become more independent, productive and happy. She provided real life stories and a universal message that life-long equal opportunities and equal rights should be available for everybody throughout the world.

the Gala Dinner with upbeat music that brought attendees to their feet and truly "rocked the house."



Dr. Sal Zimmerman and his Art Committee displayed and showcased artwork by children and young adults from around the world. Dr. Marcel Lebrun and his Auction Committee organized the silent and live auctions. They raised \$3,000 US for the Marg Csapo Scholarship Fund.

A closing panel presentation emphasized the importance of an individual journey as seen through the perspective of a parent, international organization, and advocates with special needs. This session explored special needs as an outcome of complex interactions and offered practical solutions. This approach toward inclusive education was reflected by each presenter's great passion and reminded participants to start at the beginning, not at the end, to strive toward the goals of educating all.

A New Volunteer Service Project Site

I would like to introduce a new IASE Voluntary Service Project site located in Arusha, Tanzania, East Africa. It is the Jaffery Academy-Intellectual Enhancement Unit that serves children and youth with special needs. Recently, I had the honor of volunteering at this site. The purpose was to work with staff that support the needs of a full spectrum of children and youth with special needs within the framework of the Jaffery Academy,

a private school of 1,000 students. The Head of Department, Swaleha Mohamedali, a highly talented and motivated special education leader explains the concept recently introduced and the goals of our 18-hour three-day workshops.

The purpose of the workshops was three-fold: (1) To introduce special education pedagogy from the perspective of cultural expectations; (2) To assist the staff in long range planning for successful implementation of Individualized Education Plans (IEPs) for students with disabilities; and (3) To give direction and develop a comprehensive plan for educators to introduce functional skills for pre-employment as well as vocational skills.

International Association of Special Education The 13th Biennial General Membership Meeting

Tuesday July, 9, 2013

Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada

The 13th Biennial General Membership Meeting was called to order by President Paula Leitz, presiding at 8AM. There was a quorum present. Jim Chapple moved that the Minutes of the 12th Biennial General Membership meeting held at the University of Namibia in July 2011 and published in the Annunziatus Newsletter Summer 2011 be accepted. Iris Drower seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously.

Iris Drower, Co-chairman of the 13th Biennial Conference reported that 330 people from 35 countries were registered. She expressed thanks to her co-chair Marg Csapo for her ground work in preparing for the conference and to the local committee for all their help. She asked that everyone fill out the evaluation form.

Jim Chapple, the treasurer, reported that as of June 15, 2013, IASE had a balance of \$315,437.60. Some of this money will carry over to 2014 because those who attended the conference have paid their dues for 2014. Jim and Karen Sealander, the membership chair, are working on updating the membership records. They created and issued membership cards for all IASE members. Iris Drower moved that the Treasurer's Report be accepted. Marg Csapo seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously.

Karen Sealander, the membership chair, reported that the current IASE membership is 385 members. Each member representing developed and developing countries, regular and student memberships, institutional and lifetime memberships receives electronically a confirmation of membership and a welcome letter. Richard Freeze moved that the report be accepted. Bob Henderson seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously.

Mary Gale Budzisz presented the Nominating Committee Report for Bill Towne. A slate was presented and published in the Annunziatus newsletter Volume XXIII, Issue 4, Spring 2013. On January 1, 2014, The newly elected officers will be: President-Elect - Jim Chapple - USA, Treasurer - Steve Leitz, USA, Secretary: Virginia MacEntee, USA, Member-at-Large - Malgorzata (Gosia) Sekulowicz - Poland: Member-at-Large - Sajjad Khan - Bangladesh, Member-at-Large - Ambumulire Phiri - Malawi. Richard Freeze moved that the Nominating Committee Report be accepted. Bob Henderson seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously.

Lynn Alyward, Chair of GIVING, reported the expenditures of this fund since 2011. The Volunteer Service Project sites that were the 2011 recipients of \$10,412.59 were: Hope for Life, Bangladesh; Songshoptaque, Bangladesh; Vimukti Girls School, India; Sankalp, India; Lebenshilfe, India; Mwayi Trust, Malawi; Mzuzu University, Malawi. In 2012 the GIVING Fund gave \$6,501.95 to these sites: Don Bosco, India; Vimukti Girls School, India; Lebenshilfe, India; Hope for Life, Bangladesh; Songshoptaque, Bangladesh; Mwayi Trust, Malawi. In the first six months of 2013 the GIVING Fund gave \$2,631.62 to Mzuzu University, Malawi; Mwayi Trust, Malawi; and to the four new sites in Vietnam. IASE provided \$50,000 US in seed money for the Mwayi Trust Vocational Centre that is being constructed in Blantyre, Malawi. Richard Freeze moved that the GIVING Report be accepted. Ginny MacEntee seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously.

Mary Gale Budzisz, Co-Chair of the Volunteer Service Project, reported that there are 20 volunteer sites at this time. In 2012 the two new sites added in Tanzania were: The Jaffery Academy-Intellectual Enhancement Unit (SEN) located in

Arusha and developed by IASE member Swaleha Mohamedali and the Toa Nafasi Project in Moshi organized and founded by Sarah Rosenbloom. In Vietnam the following new sites have been added: The Santa Maria Clinic coordinated by Dr. Phan Giang in Ho Chi Minh City; the Ho Chi Minh University of Education under the guidance of Dean Le Thi Minh Ha; the College of Medicine and Pharmacy located in Hue under the direction of Dr. Nguyen Viet Nhan; and the Dien Ban Day Centre managed by the Kinah Foundation under the direction of Jackie Waffer. Jim Chapple moved that the Volunteer Report be accepted and Marg Csapo seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously. Mary Gale and Marg awarded the Mary Gale Volunteer Service Project Award certificates of appreciation to the following conference attendees: Sara Devi, Lebenshilfe, India; Dr. Phan Giang, Santa Maria Clinic, Vietnam; Sandra Trevethen, Mwayi Trust, Malawi; Swaleha Mohamedali, Jaffery Academy, Tanzania; Kathy Daquilanea, Santa Maria Clinic, Vietnam; Iris Drower, Santa Maria Clinic, Vietnam; Richard Zigler, Jaffery Academy and SekuCo, Tanzania; Virginia MacEntee, Santa Maria Clinic, Vietnam; and Marg Csapo for the Santa Maria Clinic, Vietnam; Songshoptaque, Bangladesh; Lebenshilfe, India; and Mwayi Trust, Malawi. Ginny MacEntee moved that the Volunteer Service Report be accepted. Richard Freeze seconded the motion and it was carried by unanimous vote.

Rick Freeze, National Chairs Program Coordinator, announced that an initiative to have National Chairs was approved by the IASE Board in October 2012. Six National Chairs have been nominated and approved: UK - Bronwen Hewitt, Pakistan - Yousaf Masih, Tanzania - Swaleha Mohamedali, India - Anupriya Chada, Sweden - Girma Berhanu, and Zimbabwe - Darlington Changara. Iris Drower moved that the National Chairs Program Coordinator's Report be accepted. Marg Csapo seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously.

Renáta Tichá, Newsletter Editor, reported that the newsletter is a medium of communication with IASE members around the world. The newsletter is published quarterly and a hard copy is sent to all members. In the Spring 2013 newsletters were postal mailed to 430 members. The web master posts a PDF copy of the newsletter at <http://www.iase.org/> the following quarter. Iris Drower moved that the Newsletter Report be accepted. Ginny MacEntee seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously.

Morgan Chitiyo, the Journal Editor, reported that 430 journals at a cost of \$4360.16 were printed. Dr. Greg Prater and Dr. Malgorzata Sekulowicz continue to serve as Associate Editors. We currently have a total of 42 Consulting Editors from 16 countries. A debut topical issue will be published online in the Fall of 2014 based on the theme of the 13th Biennial conference, i.e. inclusion from around the world. We are currently receiving and processing manuscripts. With the introduction of a biennial topical issue, the consulting editors are overwhelmed with reviews. We will, therefore, be recruiting more consulting editors. Ginny MacEntee moved that the Journal Report be accepted. Iris Drower seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously.

Mary Gale Budzisz presented the Marg Csapo Scholarship Committee Report for Sister Mary Karen Oudeans who had resigned. Eight scholarships were offered and letters written to inform everyone about lodging and registration forms to be submitted to the treasurer. Recipients Mary Louise Mostert from Namibia, Pamela February from Namibia and Ambumulire Phiri from Malawi received their visas and were honored at the Gala Dinner. The other five recipients had visa problems. Ginny MacEntee moved that the Report be accepted. Richard Freeze seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously.

New Business: Announcements:

Malgorzata (Gosia) Sekulowicz announced that the 14th Biennial Conference will be held in Wroclaw, Poland. A short video presentation about Wroclaw, Poland, followed the announcement.

Adjournment:

Ginny MacEntee moved and Sarah Devi seconded the motion for adjournment. The meeting was adjourned at 7:55 AM.
