Volunteer Team Visit to Tanzania

The local Welcome Committee appeared at the Dar Es Salaam Airport promptly at 1:25 PM on Wednesday, July 16, 2014. From that moment on all arrangements prepared by IASE National Chair Swaleha (Sally) Mohamedali went like clockwork. We were whisked away in two loaded vans to our DAR lodging, Nico Kamero's lovely home. His wife Deanna and daughter Tricia welcomed us. Meghan Gallagher, Iris Drower and I became part of the family instantly.

The next day we reunited with Farida Khakoo, National Chairperson for the DIANA Women Empowerment Organization (DIWEO), and saw the new items meticulously sewn, stitched and prepared for sale to help support the organization. A short walk in her community took us to the monthly food bank she holds for local women. Next, we were treated to a lovely lunch hosted by the Hon. Emmanuel Ole Naiko, Honorary Counsul of Botswana-Tanzania, who is on the DIWEO Board. After television and newspaper interviews, we went on a shopping excursion. It is truly an adventure to watch Farida in action, negotiating, bargaining, estimating, analyzing, and finally purchasing items for the orphans at our Tanga VSP site. We purchased backpacks, school and food supplies and clothing for all.

Friday started with a meeting at the Ministry of Education SEN Department, introductions of people who had traveled from afar and promises to work together in the future. Then school visits with warm welcomes by staff and children sharing songs and dances. Amina Suleiman, CEO of the Stone Town Mnazi Mmoja Hospital VSP Project in Zanzibar, arrived from the ferry to join us. She brought her "wish list" and we were able to shop for the items that afternoon.

On Saturday we were lucky to have Farida share her driver Mubarak (Sweetheart) and Interpreter Tonny. They picked us up in a loaded van and began a driving excursion to Tanga with a variety of stops along the road. We delivered staples like rice, oil and sugar to various locations. All were learning experiences for us. The arrival at our site in Tanga was heartwarming for me because I got to reunite with the orphans who have grown into fabulous young people and with the caretakers who have been creating a family for all.

Sunday was a driving trip up the mountains to Lushoto. On Monday we met with staff at Sebastian Kolowa Memorial University (SEKOMU).

There we were treated to a campus tour including their fantastic new Benjamin William Mkapa Auditorium. We were also given a presentation about the history of the University plus the projected plans for the future as well as treated to a delicious lunch. A drive down the mountain and arrival in Arusha took a number of hours ... interesting roads and detours, too.

On Wednesday we started shopping for Sally's "wish list". Her connections in Arusha helped immensely with cost savings and swift delivery of the purchases. In the afternoon we visited the campus of Jaffery Academy. When I saw the newly constructed building for children with special needs, I was truly taken aback because I knew the previous small little classroom where the classes began five years ago. The super teaching staff, parents, children and a Board Member, the charming Mr. Muslim Remtula, greeted us and then we shared information about our IASE Volunteer Service Project.

We were able to present items provided by our GIVING Fund: Big Keys keyboards, computers, a refrigerator, a sewing machine and some beautifully designed and constructed classroom furniture. The smiles on the faces of the children, parents and teachers were sincere thanks to all IASE members who made these gifts possible.

On Wednesday Eunice Tondi, representing the Arusha City Council, organized visits to five local schools and we were treated by representatives of the Itemba Foundation to a fabulous lunch. We also shopped for a water dispenser for Sally's School.

Thursday was another learning experience with the pleasure of meeting Susan Michell a special educational consultant who also has created Masijo Tours which specializes in tourism for our special populations. She also has plans to construct lodging which will be handicapped accessible. She drove us to Moshi to connect with our final visitation site. Sarah Rosenbloom and Angie Stone-McDonald welcomed us to the Toa Nafasi Project located in a local elementary school.

They have assessed 160 primary students and are presently helping about 25 of the most needy students. A pull out support program has been implemented and students are getting help in literacy and numeracy. We were lucky to be able to spend some time in their classroom. Then shopping for school supplies was much fun.

IASE Volunteering in Malawi

In the spring of this year I was fortunate to spend five weeks in the warm heart of Africa - Malawi. My IASE Volunteer time was split between two sites, in April and May, Mzuzu University, in the northern region of Malawi and Mwayi Trust, located in the southern part of Malawi near Blantyre. At Mzuzu University I began a collaboration with the IASE National Chair, Ambumulire Phiri, that will see us continue to work together in the coming year on curriculum development and community outreach in the areas of special and Inclusive education. I had the pleasure of giving a public lecture on "Inclusive Education in Canada" while on campus and I met with graduate students of the Education Department.

During my time at Mzuzu University (or "Mzuni" as many folks call it), Ambumulire and I were able to meet with faculty and university administration to plan possible next steps for a graduate degree in Inclusive Education as well as develop a proposal for the Mzuzu University Centre for Inclusive Education (M.U.C.I.E.). A lot was accomplished in a short time due to the leadership of Ambumulire and the enthusiastic cooperation and mentorship of Head of the Education Department, Ms. Febbie Chimbambo, as well as Vice Chancellor, Dr. Robert Ridley, and Deputy Vice Chancellor, Dr. Loveness Kaunda.

Some of the work envisioned for MUCIE is to strengthen teacher education and professional development in all areas of Inclusive Education, such as HIV/AIDS education, gender and schooling, dis/ability support, anti-poverty action and cultural/linguistic diversity. Another main purpose of the center is to deepen the capacity for Mzuzu University to support postsecondary students with disabilities. Ambumulire and I met with community-based disability education groups (representatives from the Synod of Livingstonia) and made a site visit to meet with the staff and students at the Loudon School for the Deaf in Embagweni, in order to initiate a network for future partnerships. With assistance from the IASE Giving Fund, many donated teaching resources have already been shipped for use within the proposed center at Mzuzu University. My daughter volunteered at the children's library and made a donation of children's books we brought from Canada. All in Mzuzu warmly welcomed my family and me.

The second part of my IASE volunteering was working with Sandra Trevethan, Executive Director of Mwayi Trust. IASE has been partnering with Mwayi Trust for several years on two projects: Mwayi Trust Homework Centers and the construction of an Inclusive Vocational Training Centre. While staying at what I affectionately refer to as the "IASE guesthouse villa", a lovely renovated space next to Sandra's house, Sandra and I were able to write and submit a proposal to an international human rights organization for funding to support the purchase of learning materials and furniture for the Mwayi Trust Inclusive Vocational Centre, once construction is complete.

With the help of my husband and daughter, we made many learning games for the Mwayi Homework Centers. Another significant part of my work with Mwayi Trust was the planning and delivery of an instructional workshop for teachers who coordinate and support the peer educators at the after-school homework centers and a workshop for the peer educators themselves. Patron teachers were happy to gain professional development in the areas of literacy assessment, and multi-level instructional strategies.

The peer educators' workshop focused on literacy/ mathematics activities. The IASE Giving Fund provided the workshop materials and covered the costs. The homework centers iust were getting started after the school break when I arrived in Blantyre but I did have the chance to visit two sites.

The time spent with the Peer Educators and Patron Teachers was wonderful and their level of commitment to helping all elementary students reach secondary school was admirable.

Call for IASE Board Officers Nominations 2016-2018

Nominations are being accepted from now until **December 15**, **2014**. The following positions are open:

- 1. President-Elect, 1 to be elected for two-year term
- 2. Secretary, 1 to be elected for two-year term
- 3. Treasurer, 1 to be elected for two-year term
- 4. Member at large, 3 to be elected for two-year term

Descriptions of the roles and responsibilities for each of the above positions are in IASE's constitution and by-laws. IASE Constitution states that the Board shall be comprised of a minimum representation of 3 countries to reflect the international focus of the organization. Criteria for application include a valid IASE membership and prior experience with IASE (e.g., committee chair/work or elected position). Board members are not paid a salary and must attend meetings at their own expense. If you are interested in volunteering your time and expertise, send a letter of intent and a short (one page) resume to Paula Leitz, IASE Nominations Chair. The committee will review all nominations and forward their recommendations to the Board for ballot approval. The voting ballot will be included in the February newsletter sent to all paid members.

According to the IASE's Constitution no board member may serve more than two consecutive two-year terms in the same office.

Treasurer's Report

As of August 1, 2014, IASE had expended \$13,357 of its 2014 General Fund Budget of \$34,800 or 38%. Significant savings to the General Fund have been realized in printing and postage due to the increase in publications delivered electronically. Additionally, with respect to dedicated accounts, \$1,456 has been expended from VSP (69%) and \$18,449 from GIVING (62%).

IASE account balances are as follows:

- VSP Dedicated Account = \$644
 - Giving Dedicated Account = \$10,215
 - Marg Csapo Scholarship Dedicated Account = \$9,032
- General Fund Savings & Checking = \$225,526

Total IASE Accounts balance = \$245,417
