Bio of Mary Sima Nkatiah, PhD (Candidate) Ghana National Chair, International Association of Special Education (IASE) Part-Time Lecturer, Department of Special Education, University of Education, Winneba, Ghana



Mary Sima Nkatiah is an emerging scholar in the field of special education and currently serves as the Ghana National Chair of the International Association of Special Education (IASE). She is a part-time lecturer at the Department of Special Education, University of Education, Winneba (UEW) in Ghana, where she teaches in the areas of instructional strategies for learners with intellectual and developmental disabilities and literacy interventions for struggling readers.

With a growing portfolio of research, teaching, and advocacy, Mary is steadily establishing herself as a committed voice in inclusive education. Her academic journey is anchored in a strong dedication to literacy development and equitable learning opportunities for learners with disabilities.

She holds an MPhil in Special Education and is pursuing a PhD at UEW, where her research focuses on the role of support systems in promoting the emotional and behavioral engagement of learners with disabilities. She has presented her work at leading conferences, including the IASE Biennial Conference in the Czech Republic (June 2024). As part of her scholarly work, she is engaged in a collaborative research initiative with the University of Potsdam, focused on introducing theater-based approaches as a strategy to improve literacy in Ghanaian classrooms.

In addition to her academic roles, she is a founding member of the Disability Rights, Education, Advocacy and Mentoring (DREAM) Club and a volunteer reading instructor in Winneba. She is also a member of the Membership Committee of IASE. Mary brings energy, insight, and a community-centered approach to her work, making her a rising scholar and advocate for inclusive education in Ghana and beyond.

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Disability Support International (DSI) Piloting Virtual-Training Expansion By Jennie Wendland

Disability Support International (DSI) – an IASE member and US-based NGO – strives to build more inclusive and equitable communities through partnerships that support and strengthen local capacity. This disability development work is a process rather than a quick remedy. This partnership approach promotes continuous transformation that helps everyone—those who are "helped" as well as those who are "helpers"—to grow, learn, and improve the world, while striving to lessen the immense inequality that is the current reality. DSI currently has two main areas of programming: its online-based Global Disability Directory (available on its website) and its training program.

DSI is now beginning to expand the reach of their training program focused on increasing the capacity of local teachers and inclusive education leaders, and especially those working with children with intellectual and developmental disabilities who are all too often the most misunderstood and excluded right now in developing nations.

Originally developed and refined in Cambodia, DSI's training model emphasizes working collaboratively in partnership with local organizations. DSI is now piloting a new virtual training program to meet growing demand and overcome barriers of distance and resources. While the value of in-person engagement remains central to DSI's philosophy, access to materials and virtual coaching offers a flexible and scalable solution. This training support will provide key training resources and tools to increase the knowledge and skills of local staff, as well as customized support from skilled DSI team members for partnering organizations' leaders. We are now beginning to explore collaborative program work in Vietnam and Uganda that have expressed interest from our networking

through IASE.

DSI Expansion continued

A glimpse of the outcomes we've seen in Cambodia already:

- In 2024 alone, 392 Cambodian teachers and educational leaders participated in training sessions, reaching and improving the lives and education of 1,310 children with significant disabilities. 100% of our local leaders (Master Trainers) and 88% of teacher trainees reported improved competence and understanding after receiving DSI's training (which increased further if they were able to access ongoing coaching).
- One partner leader shared: "We found that the teacher training tools are simple, easy to understand, and easy to use... They help children with disabilities to improve and have success in school!"
- · One Master Trainer shared: "Thanks to the DSI team for the important trainings which impacted me to be more confident to help both teachers and parents"
- · Interest and involvement has been from both local NGOs and also from within the National Institute for Special Education (a department in the Cambodian Ministry of Education), working to develop the profession of special education now.

In our world today, people with disabilities are among the most disadvantaged and marginalized groups, particularly in developing nations, and in low-income countries, up to 90% of children with disabilities never attend school. Not because they can't learn—but because schools aren't prepared to teach them.

That's a gap we can work to close—together.

Staying Rooted Through Collective Purpose By Stacy-Ann N. Hylton, MSW Doctoral Student, Virginia University

Remaining grounded in the helping profession requires resilience, self-care, and a strong sense of community. In a field where emotional labor is a constant reality, our connections with others are the anchors that keep us stable. Over the past two decades, I have realized that meaningful work, especially within complex and under-resourced systems, is sustainable only when connected to a shared purpose and supported



by family, mentors, colleagues, and friends who resonate with our values.

This past May, I was honored to join the International Association of Special Education (IASE). I received this invitation from a long-time friend and former colleague, whose unwavering commitment to education, support, and inclusion of persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities I have always admired. Given our professional history and shared vision, this opportunity was a natural progression in my career. It came at a time when I sought deeper engagement in spaces prioritizing community, cross-cultural dialogue, research, and global practices around services and education for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD). This experience reaffirmed a truth I've long understood: we can achieve success by connecting with others who care about reaching our shared goals.

I am a Clinical Behavioral Therapist at Behavioral Treatment Services (BTS), a state-contracted and funded program under Riverside Community Care. BTS specializes in providing outpatient mobile mental health treatment for adults with I/DD, many of whom have dual diagnoses and behavioral challenges. Our team collaborates closely with the Massachusetts Department of Developmental Services to serve clients throughout eastern and central Massachusetts.

What distinguishes BTS is our mobile, community-oriented approach. We deliver therapy directly to individuals in the comfort of their homes, day programs, and other familiar environments, effectively removing barriers to access and fostering trust through consistent engagement. In my role, I conduct diagnostic evaluations and assessments and provide evidence-based individual and group therapy, all rooted in cultural humility. As an immigrant and someone deeply committed to social justice, I view every clinical interaction as an opportunity to affirm dignity and confront systemic inequities.

Beyond my clinical work, I have been a Clinical Field Instructor, guiding advanced practice social work students as they integrate theory, research, and social justice into their practice. These mentoring relationships have become some of the most fulfilling experiences of my career. Both giving and receiving mentorship sustain and inspire me.

I remain deeply connected to the field through my work with BTS and my position on the IASE Membership Committee. We must support one another to prevent burnout and uphold the values that initially inspired us to engage in this work. Although the future remains uncertain, we can face it with strength when united. In a society that often overlooks the contributions of marginalized groups, I am committed to fostering inclusivity and creating supportive environments through therapeutic interactions and meaningful connections.

VSP Site Visits in Vietnam By Dr. Iris Drower and Mary Gale Budzisz

Our annual Volunteer Service Project visit to monitor our sites in Vietnam occurred in March 2025. Our departures from Phoenix, AZ and Charleston, SC connected at Narita /Tokyo, Japan and then we flew together to Ho Chi Minh City (HCMC), Vietnam which is remembered by us as Saigon. This is a hustle-bustle city with a population of over 9 million, which is alive 24 hours of the day and night. It takes a bit of an adventurous spirit to visit, but every moment is worthwhile. Two of our previous VSP sites have become sustainable and we no longer provide support for them. They were the Santa Maria Clinic and the Special Education Department of the Ho Chi Minh City University. BUT.....we still do plan a dinner gathering to socialize with our Saigon colleagues for food, fun, conversations, networking, ideas, and discussions on future collaborative efforts! Plus, we truly enjoy the bountiful local gifts received from them, especially the fresh mangoes that drip their delicious juice down your chin when eating.

In HCMC we visited our newest site, The Nhan Hoa Inclusive Education Development Support Centre, which was established by Nguyen Thi Thu, who was a student of Dr. Giang at the Santa Maria Clinic. This Centre provides evaluations, assessments, interventions, and instruction for children with speech delays, autism, attention-deficit hyperactivity disorders, and stuttering. The goal of this site is to teach the principles of language

development, good behavior, and communication, with early and individuated interventions to children with developmental problems. The ultimate goal is to help young students to successfully integrate into the community. Because of parental demands Ms. Thu now operates six of these centers. See photos below of Thu and her team working on communication and social skills.









In HCMC we have been lodging at the Zazz Urban Hotel and truly appreciate the Vietnamese hospitality showered upon us by Manager Katy. Luckily we had a few hours to play tourist so we attended the oldest water puppet show in town, wandered through tiny alleys to find super gelato, visited and learned about some beautiful government buildings, and finally under the guidance of Dean Nga we gained the skill of crossing busy streets facing the onslaught of hordes of motorbikes and remaining alive on the other side.



A short flight took us north to the former capital city of Hue in central Vietnam. Our VSP site is now named The Fund of Genetic Counselling for Disabled Children located within the Hue College of Medicine. Our project coordinator Phoung Anh picked us up for a rousing visit to the Future New School. It was outside play time and every student was engaged in fun activities under the new tarp on their playground, which provides a shield from the hot sun and protection from inclement weather. Smiles were readily evident on the faces of the students and staff, and a congenial atmosphere was demonstrated by everyone.

Physical enjoyment was displayed by jumping, rocking, swinging, running, sharing, and singing, laughing and just being a kid! We have been in awe of the school transformation over the last five years while the little help from our funds that have been able to supplement school and teacher supplies to broaden the educational curriculum for the students. Starting with a cramped 2-room cottage and moving to a brand new building, we have watched the thrilling development of this complex over the years. Some impressive events in this program have included: creation of the store and coffee shop; noticing the inclusion of outdoor toys and activities; the greening of the garden; the arrival of the pigs; the new painting of the fence line; all while the growth of the students and the gainful grasp of their new skills and leadership qualities were put to use in and

around the school. Thanks to Hoang and Quyen for hosting us while Jackie is in the UK attending to her parents. We were totally enthralled with the two students who showed us their newly acquired skills of embroidery and sewing. They are so lucky to have teachers to share these handicraft skills and then be able to create lovely items which can be sold for income. 
