Morgan served as the IASE Proceedings Chair for recent IASE conferences in Namibia, Canada and Poland. He also serves on the editorial board of the Journal of Research in Special Educational Needs. His current research projects include exploring autism, behavioral disorders and special education teacher preparation and professional development in Africa. Dr. Chitiyo will be addressing: Establishing a Sustainable Framework for the Development of Special Education in Africa

Dr. Kim Poon-McBrayer is currently Associate Head of Department of Education Policy & Leadership and Director of the Center for Childhood Research & Innovation at the Hong Kong Institute of Education. #### News about Centro Maya..a VSP site in Guatemala By Madelyn Ardon

Asociación Centro Maya Servicio Integral is a Guatemalan nonprofit organization located in the town of San Juan La Laguna in Sololá that works in favor of people with disabilities residing in Lake Atitlán through different programs related to education, healthcare, vocational formation and expanded coverage, contributing to generate opportunities, development and inclusion in society for people with disabilities without discrimination. It provides services such as special education, psychology physiotherapy, language therapy, services, occupational therapy, early stimulation, music-therapy, dance, theater, recreational activities and a labor inclusion program. The organization currently serves more than 140 people with all types of disabilities of ages from 0 to 85 years old.

The organization has been working in order to promote the rights of people with disabilities for over 2 decades. In 2011 the labor inclusion program Alma de Colores started working, as a result of the difficulties and discrimination that people with disabilities face in rural areas in Guatemala, that make it extremely hard for them to be active and be employed. The program has 5 working areas functioning according to a justice, inclusion and solidarity philosophy that extends to the products made in the workshops. The areas of work are: a crafts workshop that uses local seeds, a sewing workshop that uses recycled fabrics, a bakery that makes fresh integral bread with sourdough, organic agriculture that promotes native plants and a coffee shop/restaurant that serves nutritional meals. Beneficiaries of this program get paid fair rates in exchange for their work and get additional benefits that include food, therapies, transportation, small loans without interests, and access to a healthcare fund. This project collaborates with local businesses with a similar philosophy and organizes educational activities in the surrounding communities.

Centro Maya Servicio Integral is now considered a reference point for organizations that works with people with disabilities around the area and also is a trusted organization supported by the community and local authorities, especially because it works according to the indigenous population's reality and it is run by Sololá locals.

Asociación Centro Maya Servicio Integral es una organización guatemalteca sin fines de lucro ubicada en el Municipio de San Juan La Laguna, Departamento de Sololá. Trabaja en favor de personas con discapacidad de 7 municipios del nor-oeste del Lago Atitlán a través del desarrollo de programas en las áreas de educación, salud, formación vocacional y ampliación de cobertura que contribuye a generar oportunidades y promover su desenvolvimiento e inclusión en la sociedad sin discriminación. Ofrece servicios de educación especial, terapia física, terapia de lenguaje, atención psicológica, terapia ocupacional, estimulación temprana, músico terapia, danza, teatro, recreación y un programa de inclusión laboral. Actualmente cuenta con más de 140 beneficiarios con todos los tipos de discapacidad de edades de entre cero a 85 años.

La organización trabaja por la promoción de los derechos y atención de las personas con discapacidad desde hace más de dos décadas. En el año 2011 inicia el programa de inclusión laboral para personas con discapacidad Alma de Colores, tras la evidente necesidad de la creación de un espacio que permita a las personas con discapacidad desenvolverse en el ámbito laboral, situación que se complica debido a la discriminación y exclusión que enfrentan, sobre todo en las áreas rurales del país. Este proyecto cuenta con 5 áreas de trabajo desarrolladas de acuerdo a una filosofía de justicia, inclusión y solidaridad que se extiende a los productos realizados. Las áreas que se trabajan son: artesanía con semillas locales; costura con telas recicladas; panadería integral a base de masa madre; agricultura orgánica que promueve plantas tradicionales y un café/comedor que sirve comida nutritiva. Los beneficiarios de este programa reciben ingresos justos por cada producto que entregan, además de beneficios como alimentación, terapias, transporte, préstamos sin intereses y acceso a una caja de salud. El proyecto colabora con negocios de filosofía similar y organiza actividades educativas en las comunidades donde se desenvuelve.

Centro Maya Servicio Integral se configura actualmente como un punto de referencia para las organizaciones que trabajan con discapacidad en la zona, también como una organización que goza amplia confianza de parte de las comunidades y autoridades locales, precisamente porque se desarrolla de acuerdo a la realidad de los indígenas y es administradas personas locales.

In addition to spending time at the school and learning about all of the wonderful programs for the students, we also got to taste the delightful food at the new restaurant. Plus, it was a pleasant experience to have Valentina escort us to Recrea, the new shop overlooking the beautiful Lake Atitlan, located in Panajachel, Guatemala, which is a part of the Association of Craftsmen of Sololá Atitlan Santiago.

The mission of Recrea is to increase the abilities and improve opportunities for people with disabilities. It facilitates and promotes sustainable development through projects to créate sociatal awareness about labor rights and inclusion in general.

## Call for IASE Boaard Officers Nominations 2017-2019

Nominations are being accepted from now until December 1, 2016

The following positions are open:

- 1. President-Elect, 1 to be elected for two-year term
- 2. Secretary, 1 to be elected for two-year term
- 3. Treasurer, 1 to be elected for two-year term
- 4. Member at large, 3 to be elected for two-year term

Descriptions of the roles and responsibilities for each of the above positions are in IASE's constitution and by-laws. IASE Constitution states that the Board shall be comprised of a minimum representation of 3 countries to reflect the international focus of the organization. Criteria for application include a valid IASE membership and prior experience with IASE (e.g., committee chair/work or elected position). Board members are not paid a salary and must attend meetings at their own expense.

If you are interested in volunteering your time and expertise, send a letter of intent and a short (one page) resume to Dr. Marg Csapo, IASE Nominations Chair. These documents can be emailed to margcsapo@shaw.ca or postal mailed to Marg Csapo, 3483 W. 18th Ave., Vancouver, CANADA BC V6S 1A8. The committee will review all nominations and forward their recommendations to the Board for ballot approval. The voting ballot will be included in the February newsletter sent to all paid members. According to the IASE's Constitution no board member may serve more than two consecutive two-year terms in the same office.

# Featured Member

Dr. Monica R Brown

Dr. Brown is a Professor of Special Education in the Department of Educational and Clinical Studies at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. Prior to becoming higher education in faculty in 2001, she was a K-12 resource room teacher in Clark County School District in Las Vegas. Her areas of disability expertise are in learning disabilities and other high-incidence disabilities. She is particularly interested in issues that impact the academic and behavioral wellbeing of culturally and linguistically diverse adolescents with disabilities in the school setting.

#### PROSEFAM SCHOOL Serving the needs of Baranquilla, Colombia's children By Cap Lee

Prosefam is a neighborhood school with arms that reached into the community to support all community members. At the helm is the mother of the neighborhood Luz Estela Narvaez. I call her the mother of the neighborhood because she serves not only many kids in the neighborhood, but served their parents also when they were children as she has been involved in this Foundation for over 25 years. She is akin to Mother Theresa because her passion for the neighborhood goes without pay, except for a few lose coins the residents of this poor neighborhood can afford. Over 90% of the students pay nothing

On a normal day, Mother Luz Estela has a meeting with seniors designed to inform them of health resources. Seniors also volunteer to work with the students in the school. Within the umbrella of the foundation is the service to young single mothers, not only with art and crafts classes in conjunction with Universidad de Atlantica, but also health and personal care classes with CENA University.

The youth have a solid program including dance classes, community events and planting a food garden in the back yard of the school. And other young adults who didn't graduate from high school, have the chance to graduate with evening classes at the school. This is done in cooperation with the local public school

And then there are the students in the school, all from the neighborhood. This includes students with a wide range of skills. Many very bright who chose to go to the school because their parents did or the convenience of the neighborhood. Many students, however, simply couldn't read and could not be supported in the public sector due to extremely large class sizes. I literally cried when I met two kids aged 13 and 16 who tried but couldn't read even the simplest word. And they didn't go to school. They gave up. What makes it sad is that the school building just didn't have enough room for them. Mother Luz and her daughter Amalia ran the school by themselves. Mother Luz spent 14 to 16 hours a day serving the community and somehow found a way to serve even more kids and adults in the neighborhood with educational needs.

The International Association of Special Education purchased desks, chairs, a printer, a computer as well as assessment programs for reading writing and math. Those assessment programs assured that all kids were monitored and learned the fundamentals needed to survive in their community. As an IASE volunteer, I taught English to adults and students in the classes, as well as, music, rhythms and games to the preschool kids.

Former students include an accountant, police captain, entrepreneur, a politician, a mechanical engineer, a nurse and many others who graduated from Prosefam. That is the sign of a successful school.

There are also senior citizens who are directed to quality health programs, single parents who not only did arts and crafts but were given health and beauty information, retired farmers and carpenters who taught the children their crafts and a wide variety of people that qualified the statement, "It takes a whole village."

Recently the program has increased in size with more students of need brought into the classes. They had no room for more students before so they assigned them to shifts throughout the day and into the evening.

But my thoughts go back to two teenage girls who couldn't read a word a year ago. They have now increased their reading by 3 grade levels. And they were so proud. I personally met so many that couldn't read. Young, old, any age that are left behind in this poor barrio in Barranquilla, Colombia.

The needs of 7 de Agosto barrio are massive. They outgrew their school which was housed in the home of Seno Luz and her daughter's family and began building a new school surrounding the house. No longer could their house be a school serving shifts that begin at sunrise and last into the night.

Now they are building a new school block by block. Whenever they get enough money for a roof, they add a roof, one room at a time. They have one completed classroom and another make-shift one. Neighborhood residents are helping generously as are students and former students.

Additional classrooms can be used when it doesn't rain because they need a floor and a roof. And the home still houses the bathrooms. But the courage of Mother Luz will eventually lead to so many more children being served. And eventually a new school building with the ability to serve those children well. She simply never gives up.
