Update about the Don Bosco Volunteer Service Project Site in Cochin, India

Since my visit with two girlfriends to India in 2005, I have had the pleasure of being most welcome at the Don Bosco Snehabhavan Project. Throughout the years it has been my pleasure to return to learn about this multifaceted project. I was very impressed with all services offered to the community. The vision of Don Bosco is to reach out to the children of the street and to the young at risk, to inspire and support them towards a new life and to help them get integrated back into the mainstream society. Father P.D. Thomas shared the activities provided by this project. He took us to visit

the campus for the younger boys and also to visit the girls who were housed in a small three-bedroom house located a few miles away. There were about 20 girls and one house mother at that location. A need for a much larger house was quickly noted.

In 2006 Don Bosco applied to become an IASE Volunteer Service Project. Many building projects have evolved since that time. One new home for the girls was built for the younger girls, and now those girls have moved into a lovely brand new home....so there are now two homes serving the needs of the girls. It is wonderful to continue to visit and see the girls gain new skills, attend school, make long range goals, and become contributing members of their community.

In 2012 Father Thomas moved south to Trivandrum to become the Director of the Don Bosco Veedu Society, an NGO primarily working for the care and protection of street children, slum children, young at risk and the empowerment of women. Father Joe Fernandez then became the Director and he was our IASE contact for the next six years. His local research deemed the necessity of creating a counseling center for the boys because of a huge influx of drugs into the community. With his plans and fund-raising ability, the new Psychosocial Support Centre building now stands on the main campus. Father Varghese Pynadath became the Director in 2018 when Father Joe was assigned to another program in the Kerala area. He continued to be able to educate and form many underprivileged children into honest citizens. Our Volunteer Service Project GIVING funds have provided a variety of items including upgrading the shower facilities for the older boys, recreational items, school supplies, a generator to supply electricity when needed, and the tables which were built for the study/food service room.

In May 2020 Father P.D. Thomas will return to Cochin and the Don Bosco Snehabhavan Project as the new Executive Director. We wish him the best of luck in all endeavors to provide the skills to the 300+ children with behavioral and emotional problems, who may have been physically and/or sexually abused, sold by parents for beggary, forced into child labor, or have had various conflicts with the law.

IASE VSP- UPDATE BY SANKALP SOCIETY DURING COVID-19 CRISIS

Greetings from Sankalp Society!!!!!





During this lockdown we continue to give food to our children strictly adhering to the social distancing norm. Sankalp works in and with real communities. We have so far given dry essential items (wheat flour, rice, pulses, salt, spices, masks, sanitizers, and cooking oil) to families of 200 children who we cover under our NGO. The food items will last 15 days for a family of 4-5 people. Parents of most of these children are daily wagers and do not have any jobs currently. All are migrants. We do not know how long the lockdown would last; hence, we want to reach out to their families. Our skill development unit (mainly funded by IASE) comprising girls and young women is making masks for local communities and we have also trained our children on hygiene practices.

The Toa Nafasi Project Needs Volunteers

The Toa Nafasi Project—meaning provide a chance in Swahili—is a grassroots education NGO registered in 2012 and located in Moshi Municipal District, Kilimanjaro region, Tanzania. Working within the public-school system, Toa helps Standard One students with learning difficulties to overcome challenges and succeed in the classroom. Through its Early Childhood Education Platform, The Project approaches students holistically to create a safe space where differences are respected, inclusion embraced, and every student in the classroom has an equal opportunity to succeed regardless of his or her learning style.

In 2019, Toa more than doubled the number of schools

in which we provide services, and in 2020, we expanded to two more schools, bringing the total number to 11 school sites across 10 wards. In order to handle these expansions, Toa currently employs 30 previously underemployed women as tutors and provides them with regular in-service training on leadership and special education pedagogies. Our specially trained tutors are responsible for providing an individualized pull-out program within schools for students found to require additional support. Approximately 90% of our Standard One students return to mainstream classrooms and proceed to Standard Two.

Volunteer!

COVID-19 is impacting education around the world, and the same goes for public schools in Tanzania. As of March 17th, schools in Tanzania were closed for 30 days. While no one can currently predict the direction of this global health crisis, we at Toa Nafasi are preparing for the time when Tanzanian schools re-open and we can continue with our programming. We are currently looking for volunteers who could potentially join us in Moshi in August this year and help this amazing organization continue to support these amazing students. Volunteering is of course subject to global health recommendations, travel restrictions and international safety recommendations.



Individuals in the IASE network have critical skills that are needed to support Toa Nafasi's work, including providing training on pedagogical tools and games to our tutors, supporting lesson-planning and sharing techniques to support students with learning differences.
