14th Biennial Conference is Coming!

It is hard to believe that the conference is about 220 days away!!! There is much to do, so please read the articles about the conference in this newsletter. Also, it is important for you to check the IASE website (www.iase.org) as there is a great deal of information about many aspects of the conference. The conference chairs (Gosia and Agnes Sekułowicz and I) are working diligently to plan not only a rewarding professional experience for you, but also a social and networking experience that will make many lasting memories.

The program is coming together!! We have had over 340 proposals submitted from 36 different countries! Morgan Chitiyo, the Program Co-Chair, and I met to review and begin to slot proposals that have been peer reviewed. A huge thank you to the many peer reviewers who volunteered to read each proposal and give some professional feedback on the selection for our program. Primary presenters will be notified by December 1, 2014, if their proposal has been selected and ALL presenters will need to register for the conference by February 1, 2015, to be included in the program. This year, along with our three Plenary Session keynoters we are highlighting five invited Showcase Sessions each of which will be two hours in length. You will find these timely and exciting topics related to the theme of our conference.

We have arranged for two educational all-day tours that you might want to consider on Thursday, June 25th. You will have a choice of a tour visiting three schools in the Wroclaw area or taking a tour to the Society of Saint Celestine Rehabilitation Center in Strzelin. These tours are at an additional charge to cover the bus and lunch costs. Check them out on the IASE website. Be sure to register early as I know they will be popular.

Gala Extravaganza at the 14th Biennial IASE Conference

The Gala for the 14th Biennial IASE Conference will be held at the Centennial Hall in Wroclaw, Poland. Centennial Hall is a unique venue on the map of Poland, where history harmoniously interacts with modernity. It was designed by Max Berg, an outstanding city architect, and recognized as one of the top masterpieces of the 20th century architecture. The designer assumed that the Hall was to serve citizens and visitors to Wrocław, the capital city of Lower Silesia. It continues to perform this function successfully.

Multi-purpose space, unusual structure, and the unique and spacious location represent just a few of its' strengths. The Centennial Hall complex currently is one of the most desired venues among domestic and foreign organizers for major exhibitions, conferences, cultural, sport and congress events. The Hall's inscription on the UNESCO World Heritage List in 2006 emphasized the rank of this facility. Undoubtedly, it is one of the most characteristic flagships of Wrocław on an international scale, and an exceptionally magical site in the city where the charts of history record its multi-generational experience.

The evening will be filled with a delicious dinner of traditional Polish cuisine, entertainment, a cash bar, our annual live auction to raise money for the Marg Csapo Scholarship, and the evening will be capped off with a spectacular fountain lightshow. Bus transportation will be provided to and from the gala. We encourage participants to dress in traditional clothing from their home country.

Treasurer's Report

As of November 1, 2014, IASE had expended \$14,836 of its 2014 General Fund Budget of \$34,800 or 43%. Additionally, \$27,371 of a budgeted amount of \$30,600 (89%) has been expended from the GIVING and VSP dedicated accounts.

Account balances are as follows:

- VSP Dedicated Account = \$644
- GIVING Dedicated Account = \$2,585
- Marg Csapo Scholarship Dedicated Account = \$9,032
- General Fund Savings & Checking = \$224,895

Total IASE Accounts balance = \$237,156

Mwayi Trust 2014 Workshop

Greetings from Blantyre, Malawi, from all 92 volunteers. These include 77 secondary students, 13 patrons (head teachers and classroom teachers), Sandra Trevethan from Mwayi Trust and myself, representing IASE. We all participated in the annual Mwayi Trust Workshop for Patrons and Peer Educators.

We all worked together in a large classroom at a teacher training college for four days and nights to prepare the students for the role of Peer Educators in their village primary schools. Sessions were presented on how to motivate learners, how to create appropriate learning environments, how to apply positive reinforcement, plan individual lessons, monitor progress, use educational games, etc. Each of the Peer Educators work three afternoons a week with 3-4 children who have problems in learning.

This is the first step towards special education for children who might be in a class of 175-200 with one teacher in a country where Education for All is yet to be achieved. You made this possible with your IASE GIVING Fund and volunteers to help train the Patrons who now run the workshops with lots of confidence. The Patrons' workshop preceded the Peer Educators workshop. There was fun, laughter, good interaction, full participation, and also excitement. The culminating activity of this workshop was a concert, organized by the students, singing and acting followed by a dance.

Some students have volunteered for two, some for three years as Peer Educators and many will start for the first time this September. We called a group of "veterans" together and asked them to write answers to a few questions about being a volunteer Peer Educator and share with you their experience.

Why did you become a volunteer peer Educator?

William Nyalaya, Peer Educator for two years, wrote: "I became a volunteer Peer Educator because I see some learners who continuously repeat the same class because of some problems they encounter in a large class."

Gloria Smith, Peer Educator for two years, added: "I decided to be a Peer Educator because I want to help students to learn to read, to write and to understand what school is all about. Plus to make them love school."

"I will always be proud because I taught children who have difficulties in learning. I decided to assist these learners so that they would do well in class", said Chisomo Malinga, a Peer Educator for two years.

John, her twin brother, a Peer Educator for two years, stated: "To be a Peer Educator gives me joy. I want to help slow learners and encourage them to work hard in class in order to have a better tomorrow."

"I decided to be a peer Educator to help young children who have difficulties in their education to perform better in school" added Lizzie Dolola, a Peer Educator for two years.

Give a few examples how you helped the children with learning problems?

Lizzie Dlola wrote: "I taught children who failed to learn to read and write using locally available resources, such as singing songs using the words they had to learn. I helped them to recognize the alphabet and then taught them words with consonant + vowel and vowel + consonant. I told them how much I loved them and cared for them."

"I taught them by playing traditional games that related to the lesson", said William Nyalala.

John Malinga: "I taught them self-control, how to work hard in class and be assertive".

Chisomo Malinga said she asked the teacher to place these children in the front of the class where they could see and hear better and taught them to be honest, patient and to smile at the teacher.

What was your best experience as a Peer Educator?

Gloria Smith wrote: "Teaching Fusani who failed to recognize words. Now he is reading fluently after I taught him many different words and how to put syllables together to make words."

Chisomo thinks the best experience was to learn not to punish, or use negative words, but to encourage learning with love, understanding and skills." When they succeed, they are really proud of themselves."

Do you think being a peer Educator will help you with a career choice?

"I want to be a teacher because I want to make Malawi a wonderful country full of educated people", answered Gloria.

John Malinga wants to be a judge. "As a Peer Educator I learned many skills, how to solve problems, to love everyone, to overcome my own weaknesses".

William Nyalaya and John Mwarimba want to become teachers and build on the skills they have already acquired.



May they all reach their dreams!

You should know that the Mwayi Trust Vocational Centre is standing under a sky blue metal roof waiting to open as soon as enough money is found for plastering, a cement floor, windows and doors, electrical work, plumbing and a new septic tank.

If we all saved a few pennies a day until the conference in June 2015, the school may open in September 2015 or in 2016! Thanks for all your help, it is really needed.
