Unveiling the Inclusion Collection: Stories of Artistic Evolution from Minnesota to the Czech Republic

As the IASE conference draws nearer and the unveiling of the five exhibits comprising the *Inclusion Collection* approaches, Dr. Šárka Káňová, Dr. Masha Černíková, and I find

ourselves delving deeper into the intricacies of both the artworks and the artists who bring them to life. At the heart of the conference's visual identity lies a striking depiction of Pilsen's cityscape—a vibrant tableau meticulously outlined and filled with a kaleidoscope of colors, each hue distinguishing the iconic landmarks that define this picturesque city. From the conference website to printed programs, brochures, and scattered adornments, this artwork serves as the focal point seamlessly woven throughout the event's fabric.

Crafted by Sarah Curtner, a graphic designer with the Institute on Community Integration at the University of Minnesota, this captivating artwork draws its roots from the creative wellspring of young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities who call Pilsen home. The genesis of these captivating visuals traces back to a transformative field trip, during which these students embarked on a journey to document their beloved cityscape through their own unique perspectives.

On the other side of the globe, in the United States, we catch a glimpse of "My Life," our premier exhibit. Originally debuting last summer in Minneapolis, this exhibit delves into the real lived experiences of students in transitional phases of their lives, predominantly documenting through photographs. Now, it has made its way to the Czech Republic with enhancements. In this article, we feature five transition students from two separate schools in Minnesota who have submitted original pieces of work. Transition Plus (T-plus), situated in the vibrant heart of Minneapolis, Minnesota, stands as a beacon of artistic expression for its students, particularly under the guidance of teacher AJ Molle. Recognizing the inherent talents of his students. Molle understands that their artistic journey extends far beyond the walls of Transition Plus.

At the core of the school's ethos lies a commitment to providing comprehensive arts education to individuals with disabilities. Three exceptional students—Jody, Jovan Charles, and Sonny have been handpicked to showcase their work in their inaugural international exhibition. For them, this show represents not only a platform to display their creations but also a validation of their artistic endeavors in the eyes of a global audience.

During my recent visit, I had the privilege of meeting each of these talented individuals in person. Sonny, whose forte lies in graphic art, possesses a remarkable ability to infuse his pieces with precise perspectives, instantly transporting viewers into his meticulously crafted worlds. When queried about his inspiration, Sonny gestured towards the window overlooking Lake Street—a bustling thoroughfare juxtaposed against a cemetery and brick buildings. "I start with one thing," Sonny explained, elaborating on his creative process of building intricate narratives around everyday objects. "That's all I need and everything else just comes from my head one object after another until it's done."

In contrast, Jovan draws inspiration from the realms of his imagination; weaving together a complex tapestry of interconnected universes he has named "The Shatterverse." As an avid gamer, Jovan's creations often feature superhero creatures navigating through multiple dimensions, reflecting his fascination with alternate realities. Despite starting his artistic journey long before joining Transition Plus, Jovan credits the program for nurturing his talents and propelling him to new heights. When nudged about his plans post-T-plus, he expressed his intention to pursue commissions and potentially venture into creating a graphic novel, though half joking, he acknowledged the daunting task due to the expansive nature of the Shatterverse.

In the tradition of many artists I've encountered, Sonny remained somewhat resistant about her creative process—hesitant to divulge the intricacies of how she begins or

the wellsprings of her inspiration. Yet, as the adage goes, perhaps the true essence of her art lies in its ability to communicate volumes without the need for words – art speaks for itself.

Rebecca Pauly, the driving force behind the art program at the Transition Assistance Program (TAP) in Hutchinson, Minnesota, shared insights into the remarkable progress made by students Stormi McDonald and Hugh Hudson. Hailing from the rural community of Hutchinson, located over an hour's drive from Minneapolis, Stormi and Hugh have not only showcased exceptional artistic aptitude but have also garnered admiration from peers and mentors alike. As they eagerly anticipate the international debut of their artwork, Pauly emphasizes the profound impact of TAP in empowering students to realize their artistic aspirations on a global stage.

Heading back to the Czech Republic, I learn more from Dr. Káňová and Dr. Černíková about two Czech artists. Two solo exhibitions within the Inclusion Collection feature Martina Květová and Michal Bednář. Martina Květová, a girl with severe combined disabilities born in 2008, is at the beginning of the journey of materializing her soul, and she is doing wonderfully, her sister Bára explained. She started her creative work in March 2022 and has had three separate exhibitions since then. She loves bright colors, especially red. She found herself painting with acrylic on canvas. She does not give any names to her paintings. However, this fact gives us room for our own imagination, her sister added. Martina loves music, an integral part of each of her days, just like her artwork. None of her paintings come to life without music. She selects colors and paints to her rhythm and pace, carefully and sensitively. However, not cautiously out of fear, but rather painting to her own tempo. At the end, she innocently adds, "I am really satisfied...'

Michael Bednář, who takes art lessons from Dr. Černíková, was previously featured in "My Life" last summer; now, he presents his solo show at this conference. He has intricately woven three years of his life into his artistic endeavors, encapsulating his journey through creative workshops aimed at exploring life's moments, aspirations, skills, and individuality. His life story unfolds like a book, with drawings, paintings, texts, and collages serving as vivid chapters that capture his dreams, interests, and significant events. From documenting his experiences in various settings such as school, workshops, and theater, to cherishing moments with family and friends, Bednář's artistic expression transcends mere representation, offering an original narrative of his personal and creative evolution, says Černíková. With a lifelong dedication to art, particularly ceramics, and ongoing studies at the Academy of Fine Arts, Bednář's multidisciplinary approach reflects his passion for creativity and expression, evident in his involvement in literary and dramatic endeavors. From starring roles in short films to hosting shows, Bednář's artistic journey continues to unfold, leaving an indelible mark on the cultural landscape, including regular exhibitions showcasing his work at ZUŠ Trnka.

Fund of Genetic Counseling and Disabled Children, in Hue, Vietnam Transition at Its Finest!

These young adults go through a training program and aim to serve to the highest standards. The mission is to build an employment foundation for people with special needs by teaching them job skills and helping them gain the confidence needed to be part of the workforce.

The dynamics between employees and job coaches is a unique one. This project is a great way to informally educate and transform the community at large. Students from the New School (one of the many projects within the Fund of Genetic Counseling and Disabled Children, an NGO and one of our VSP sites) in Hue, Vietnam in partnership with the French NGO Bretgne Vietnam opened their doors in December of 2023.

Centro Maya Servicio Integral Building an Inclusive Society in Guatemala Together

Despite Guatemala's endorsement of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, the government fails to meet its obligations to children with disabilities. This is demonstrated by studies into the social

position of disabled children conducted by the Incluguate partner network in Guatemala.

Viviana Contreras, Executive Director at Centro Maya (one of our VSP sites) and Mario Alonzo Teletor presented their report with findings and recommendations to the United Nations Committee on the Rights of the Child in Geneva on February 6, 2024.

Incluguate's study findings suggest the need to develop a just and inclusive society in Guatemala. This includes respecting the rights of disabled children and strengthening their role in their family, community, and society. Viviana Contreras believes that the arrival of a new government presents an opportunity for concrete change

The paper examines the rights and positions of children and youth with disabilities in education and health. Concrete proposals are presented to the Guatemalan government in order to uphold their rights and structurally enhance their social condition.

The research further identified several issues. including stigmatization, hurdles, inequality, care and education, a lack of data on disabled residents, and a paucity of specialized and certified teaching staff. In addition, the researchers presented targeted recommendations to the government. These included creating campaigns to promote inclusion, gathering reliable data on children with disabilities, developing high-quality inclusive practices, removing physical barriers and increasing accessibility, empowering parents, recognizing sign language as a fullfledged language, and improving health care for children and young adults with disabilities in rural and remote settings.

The UN Committee on the Rights of the Child submits Incluguate's study report to the Guatemalan government, along with reports from other organizations that advocate for children's rights in the nation.

The UN offers suggestions to the government and requests that they explain in a government report how they achieve compliance with the Convention on the Rights of the Child in Guatemala. Special thanks to Viviana, your actions serve as an inspiration of progress toward a more inclusive society for everyone.

IASE MINUTES FROM OUR GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING, JULY 12, 2022,

HO CHI MINH CITY, VIETNAM

Board Members Present:

Renata Ticha, President; Gulnoza Yakubova, President-Elect; Zandile Nkabinde, Past-President; Iris Drower, Treasurer; Rachael Gonzales (Voting for Pavan) Membership; Kalynn Hall Pistorio (voting for Omoke), Web; Brenda Lazarus, Secretary; Nga Ti Hoang (Voting for Josue), Extended Board.

We have a quorum. This meeting is now online.

Guests: Approximately 24 people besides the Board members were present at the meeting.

The meeting was held as part of the 17th Biennial IASE Conference.

Meeting called to order at 3:55 p.m. by President Renata Ticha.

The Minutes of the 2019 General Membership Meeting in Tanzania were available for

BOARD AND COMMITTEE REPORTS:

review. Zandile Nkabinde moved and Iris

Drower seconded the minutes.

PRESIDENT: Renata Ticha presented a brief report and explained that she just became President in January 2022. She expressed gratitude to all delegates for attending the conference since it was postponed from 2021 due to Covid-19. She expressed her belief in membership in this organization due to its commitment to working with underrepresented countries and volunteer service. Iris moved and Zandile seconded her report.

PAST PRESIDENT; Zandile Nkabinde explained that she had set up 8 Virtual Dialogues during Covid to keep members engaged with IASE. She also served on the

conference planning committee and the conference selection committee for the next conference site. Brenda moved and Rachael seconded the report

PRESIDENT-ELECT: Gulnoza Yakubova apologized for the delay in the Conference Proceeding but explained that they would be sending out to all delegates as soon as the final edits were completed. The Board decided to give the local delegates more time to have their papers edited to APA style for publication. Zandile moved and Rachael seconded the report.

MEMBERSHIP: Rachael Gonzales introduced herself as the person who is sending them reminders to renew their membership. Encouraged those present to renew or join IASE and reviewed the benefits of membership. As of June 10, 2022 we have 330 members from 32 countries. Brenda moved and Zandile seconded the report.

TREASURER: Iris Drower stated that IASE has \$13,706.68 in the checking account, \$18,861.26 in the VSP account and \$6,284.07 in the Marg Csapo Scholarship Account. Operating Budget is \$149,165.79 for a Total: 188,017,80. The 501(c)3 Internal Audit will be due in 2022. We are working with Chase Bank to streamline all accounts into some interest bearing accounts.

JOURNAL PUBLICATION: Renata Ticha explained that the journal comes out once a year, with the occasional double issue. Most members receive the electronic journal but a few hard copies are sent to libraries and some individuals who have requested them. She explained that they editors sometimes work with authors for 2-3 years to get their articles into publication quality. Journal issues can be found on the IASE website. Brenda moved and Gulnoza seconded the report.

GIVING/VOLUNTEER SERVICE Iris said we currently have 13 sites in 6 countries. Sites are in Columbia, Guatemala, Malawi, India (several), Tanzania, and Vietnam (several). She delivered \$37,376 to the sites prior to Covid-19, but only \$3000 during Covid due to travel limitations in the past two years. The application to become a Volunteer Site is on the Website as well as the application to be a Volunteer. Volunteer skills are matched with the needs of the sites as expressed in their Wish List to the VSP Committee. Kalynn moved and Zandile seconded the report.

WEBSITE: Kalynn explained that the old website has merged with a new provider (Vista-print) in the past year. She is still working with them on moving over some of the features from the old site. She is responsible for providing updates and posting newsletters and journal publications. Zandile moved and Iris seconded the report.

BOOK PUBLICATION: Iris gave a verbal report as Virginia MacEntee was not present. Ginny and Mary Gale continue to work on the publication, but Covid-19 social distancing has made their work more difficult. The book is to be a history of the Volunteer Service Project sites. Moved by Brenda and seconded by Gulnoza.

SECRETARY: Brenda outlined her job responsibilities and said she had set up the Zoom Virtual Dialogue session links, Board Meeting links and has worked on the Mentor Project with Rachael and Gulnoza. Zandile moved and Kalynn seconded the report.

NEWSLETTER: Gulnoza gave the report as the new editors were not present. She requested members to send in articles about the conference for the next edition. Iris moved and Zandile seconded the report.

NATIONAL CHAIRS: Zandile gave the report for Beatrice who was not in attendance.

There is a need to have more National Chairs. National Chairs share information about national inclusive and special needs education events in their region and recruit new members. Brenda moved and Iris seconded the report.

LOCAL COMMITTEE CHAIR: Nga

thanked everyone for attending, sharing and understanding the challenges the committee faced. She felt that not everything was a good as necessary, especially the online portion. She thanked the IASE members of the Local Committee: Rachael Gonzales, Craig Goldsberry and Daniel McCarthy and the Board Members for their support.

AUCTION CHAIR REPORT: Zandile thanked participants for bringing items for the silent and live auction and thanked the university for their warm welcome and for a performance that was "out of this world".

New Member Welcome: Zandile gave a presentation on what being a member of IASE has meant to her and why people should join IASE and/or retain their membership. IASE was founded in 1985 and over 50 countries are represented by the membership. She shared the Mission and Vision of the organization and urged those present to get involved with the organization through its' many committees and to run for board positions in the future.

Announcement of 2024 Conference Site:

Renata introduced Jan Siska who will be the host representative for West Bohemia University in Pilsen, Czech Republic. He shared a brief video of the university and of the Pilsen area. It is located near Prague.

Open Items from Members: Daniel McCarthy noted that there were few related service professionals and few K-12 teachers in attendance and suggested that the organization needed to have a larger, more inclusive conversation. This could be helped along by

expanding our reach. He plans to make a connection with social work organizations he belongs to. Iris thought the idea had merit and suggested we form a new committee to take up Daniel's suggestion.

Meeting adjourned at 4:55 p.m. by Renata. Zandile moved and Gulnoza seconded the adjournment of the 2022 General Meeting of IASE.
